MONTHLY MEETING

We just need enough cars at the race to leapfrog runners along the course to their relay legs. As soon as firm—it may have to be done before the meeting—Dale Goering will submit entries and pay fees, so everybody who's entering must be sure to reimburse him!

Have a Fowl Day

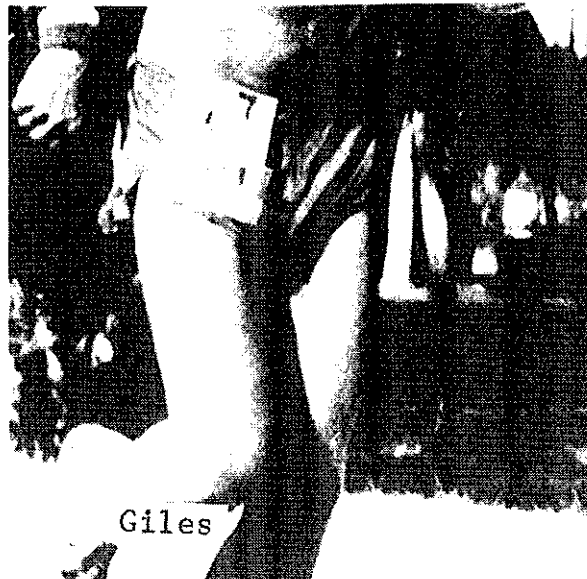
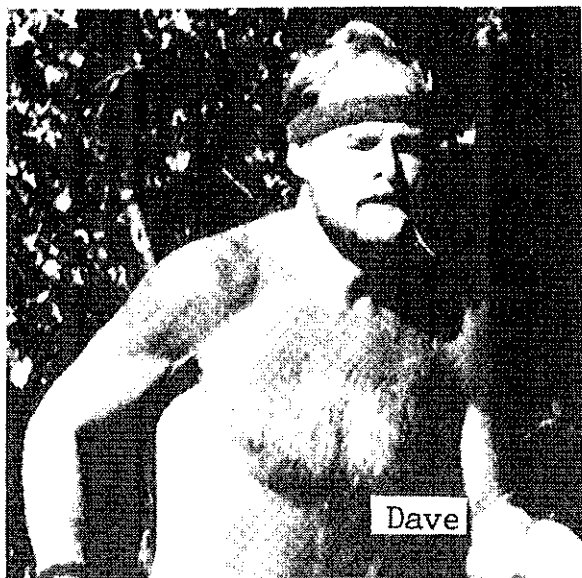
