

Jim and Diana's trip to Cozumel

We left for Houston on Friday, November 10th. Our travel arrangements were from Houston. We didn't do anything there. We arrived in **Cozumel** on Saturday to drizzly rain. It was nice though. We enjoyed the moisture.

On Sunday, the marathon and 1/2 marathon race started at 5:30 a.m.at "El Presidente", a fancy hotel. The roads were to be closed at 4:30 a.m. so we woke up at 3:30 a.m. to arrive at 4:00 a.m. The first three miles of the course started out going through jungle, an area called "Ghost town". The road was lit by torches, as daybreak was barely occurring. The scenery and aura made us feel like we were running in the distant past and different culture.

The rest of the course went on city streets through San Miguel. Jim and I both started out rather fast. (He faster than me). We were weaving through a crowd of 730 runners. The weather was humid due to the rain the day before. Purified water and an energy drink were served in sealed plastic bags. We'd get a bag, tear open a corner and have liquid to drink at our convenience.

In the 1/2 marathon race, Jim came in 10th overall with a time of 1:27:47, chasing 18 seconds behind the first woman. **Kim Jones**, a former Olympic Trials qualifer from Boulder, CO. was first woman. I was fourth woman overall. Jim and I were both third overall as Master runners.

I was keeping a 7:36 pace until mile 9. Then my hips and legs just stiffened up. I could feel the pounding of my joints on the hard limestone streets. My pace fell to around 8:30 - 9:00. I was hoping for 1 hour and 40 minutes, instead I finished 1 hour and 43 minutes.

We met new friends on the shuttle from the airport to our hotel, Tracy and Dan from Brooklyn, NY. We enjoyed visiting with them (more people than just ourselves). Dan ran the fastest 1/2 marathon time in our group and Tracy didn't run. All of us who ran received an age group award. The top three runners in each race received the overall awards. The rest of us received age group awards in five year age groups. Dan got 2nd in the 40-44 men. Jim got 1st in the 45-59 men. I got 1st in the 40-44 women.

Our hotel was nice. It was quiet, quaint and on the beach. The plants and trees were beautiful — quite green and/or colorful. On Monday, Jim and I did some shopping in San Miguel. We intended to go scuba diving that day, yet we couldn't get in contact with the dive operator who we had made arrangements. We went snorkeling and drank beer instead.

On Tuesday, Jim and I rode the ferry to the mainland, to the seaport town of "Playa de Carmen". We rented a Volkswagen bug and drove south towards "Tuluum", an ancient Mayan ruin site. We intended to stop there on our way back. We drove on to "Coba", another ancient Mayan ruin site. Another road took us forty miles inland into the jungle. The trip was fun, sorta spooky. We drove through small villages or neighborhoods. There were lots of "topes" or speed bumps in the road at those junctures. Finally we arrived at the village of Coba. We had to pay to park; to walk on the trails; and to use the banos or bathroom. The trails were white due to the limestone and quite shady. Historical texts mention the Mayan Indians built white roads 100's of kilometers long to connect to other sites, such as Tuluum. We walked about 2 miles and saw pyramids of different sizes; large, flat, upright rocks with bas-relief sculptures carved in them; and large, slanted, limestone apparatuses with hoops that the Mayans used to play a ball game. Finally, we climbed up the largest pyramid and was able to look all around the horizon. From this vantage point we saw large green mounds rising up throughout the jungle. The mounds were other pyramids that haven't been excavated yet. They still had vegetation growth all over them. Coba was neat in that it isn't commercialized. The location is not as easy to get to as Tuluum and other places along the mainland coastline where a highway joins them.

On Wednesday, we made our way back to Houston, Dallas, Albuquerque, then Santa Fe. We arrived home at midnight, and then had to set our clocks back for Mountain time. We were tired, but our adventure was worth it!



Gore to challenge result

Recount plods along in Broward


FORT LAUDERDALE, Fia. — After all the shouting and the shoving, the demonstrations and denouncements, the contest became one of staying awake yesterday.

For almost six hours, Broward County election officials poked at disputed ballots, prodded ballots, held ballots up to the light — one by one by one. They debated chads—dimples, and detached corner y squinted so much the aud. ... almost got a headache.

By midafternoon, in time for turkey but far too soon to say which presidential candidate would win in Florida, Vice President Al Gore had a net gain of 225 votes. George W. Bush got 14, reducing his unofficial lead to 719 from 930 statewide. For its part, the canvassing board was thankful it got through an entire box of disputed ballots, leaving three more boxes to go by the 5 p.m. Sunday deadline set by the Florida Supreme Court.

"We'll get there," county commissioner and vote counter Suzanne Gunzburger vowed as she headed home.

That means 12-nour days or souger for Broward's canvassing board, the only one to convene on Thathaspring. Palm Beach County, with even more ballots at stake, returns to its hand recount of bal-BROWARD COUNTY, Page 447

MIAM! — The Florida Supreme Court yesterday dealt Al Gore a serious blow by refusing to force Miami-Dade County to resume its handcount of presidential ballots, but the vice president's camp yowed to keep fighting.

While Republicans celebrated the court decision, Gore's lawyers said they would challenge Miami-Dade's voting results no later than Monday, and that Gore would not yet concede a race that already has gone 17 days past Election Day.

Each candidate needs Florida's 25 Electoral College votes to win the presidency, and most observers say that Gore needed to pick up votes in Democratic-leaning Miami to overcome George W. Bush's slim lead.

But a Democratic Party leader yesterday said the two other Florida counties undergoing recounts still could give Gore a victory before the count-ordered deadline of 5 p.m. Sunday. Unofficial talkes of the recounts yesterday showed that Gore has gained 217 wors, leaving him 713 votes behind Bush.


Lincoln was shot at the theater named Ford.
